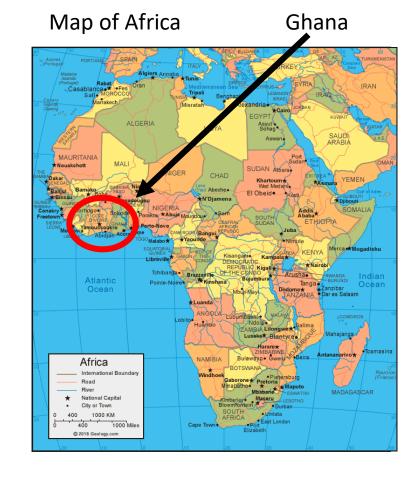


Year 2 Fairtrade and Ghana

Key Content:

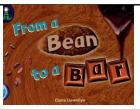
- Where the hot and cold places are located on earth.
- Where the equator is and what the equator is recognised as.
- Recognise that Africa is a continent, with 52 countries.
- How to locate Africa on a map and identify countries within Africa.
- Recognise that some foods we eat are grown in UK and some are grown aboard.
- Identify that the seasonal weather impacts on the produce grown in the UK and recognise that we import food from other countries that cannot be grown in the UK.
- Identify that chocolate comes from parts of African, where cacao beans are grown on plantations.
- Recognise the process of making chocolate.
- Identify how places can be different to their own and identify features of life in different countries.
- Compare families jobs locally in the food produce industry to jobs in the food produce industry in Ghana, Africa.
