Think like a historian by

Using secondary sources of photographic images from the expedition to ask questions and explain what the sources tell us.

National Curriculum coverage

Chronology - Placing events in order, using common words and phrases about the passing of time.

Events, People and Changes - Recognising the difference between their lives and those of people in the past. Enquiry - Ask questions about the past through observing a range of sources.

Communication - To show what they know and understand about the people of the past in different ways e.g speaking, role play, drawing or writing.

Locational Knowledge - Name and locate the world's 7 continents and 5 oceans.

Human & Physical Ğeography - Locate cold areas of the world in relation to the equator and North and South

Lesson sequence

- Who was Captain Robert Falcon Scott? Finding out about his first and second attempt to reach the south pole.
- Find out about Captain Robert Scott and Roald Amundsen's expedition to Antarctica. Timeline.
- Compare each explorer's journey to the South Pole.
- Look in detail at Captain Scott's account of the expedition by looking at diary entry.
- Find out about local explorer F J Hooper and his contribution to Captain Scott's expedition.
- > What can we learn from Captain Scott / Who has visited the South pole that is alive today.

Key Content

- > Finding out about the life of explorers and how they contributed to national and international life.
- > Following Robert Falcon Scott's team on their expedition.
- > Sharing the problems that they faced ponies, motorised vehicles, bad weather and their unpreparedness.
- > Comparing their expedition to that of Roald Amundsen's and how prepared they were.

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
